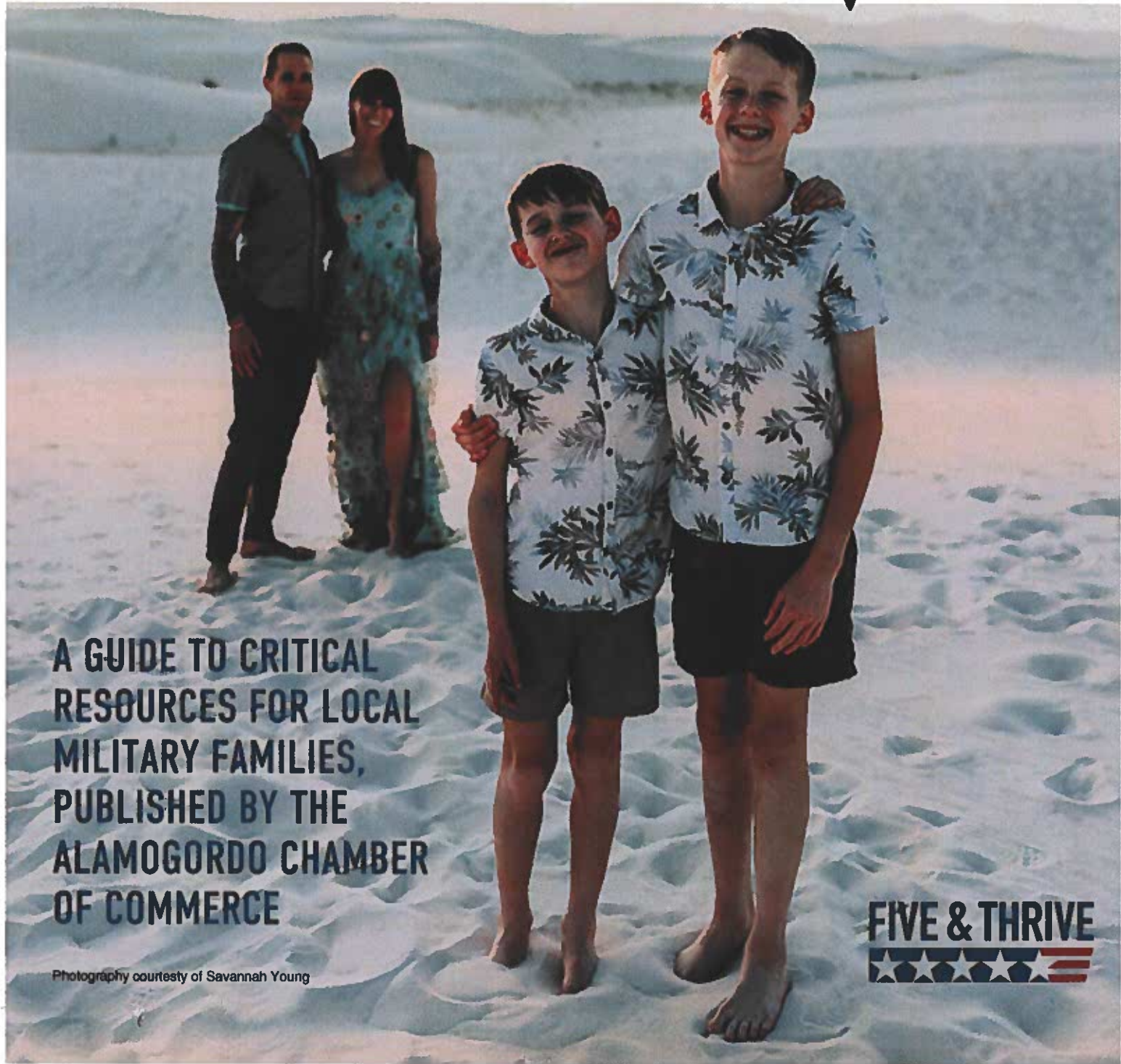

That's why we've created our local Thrive Guide for Holloman AFB and the community of Alamogordo, New Mexico.

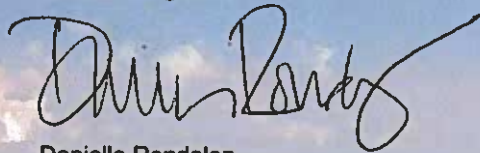

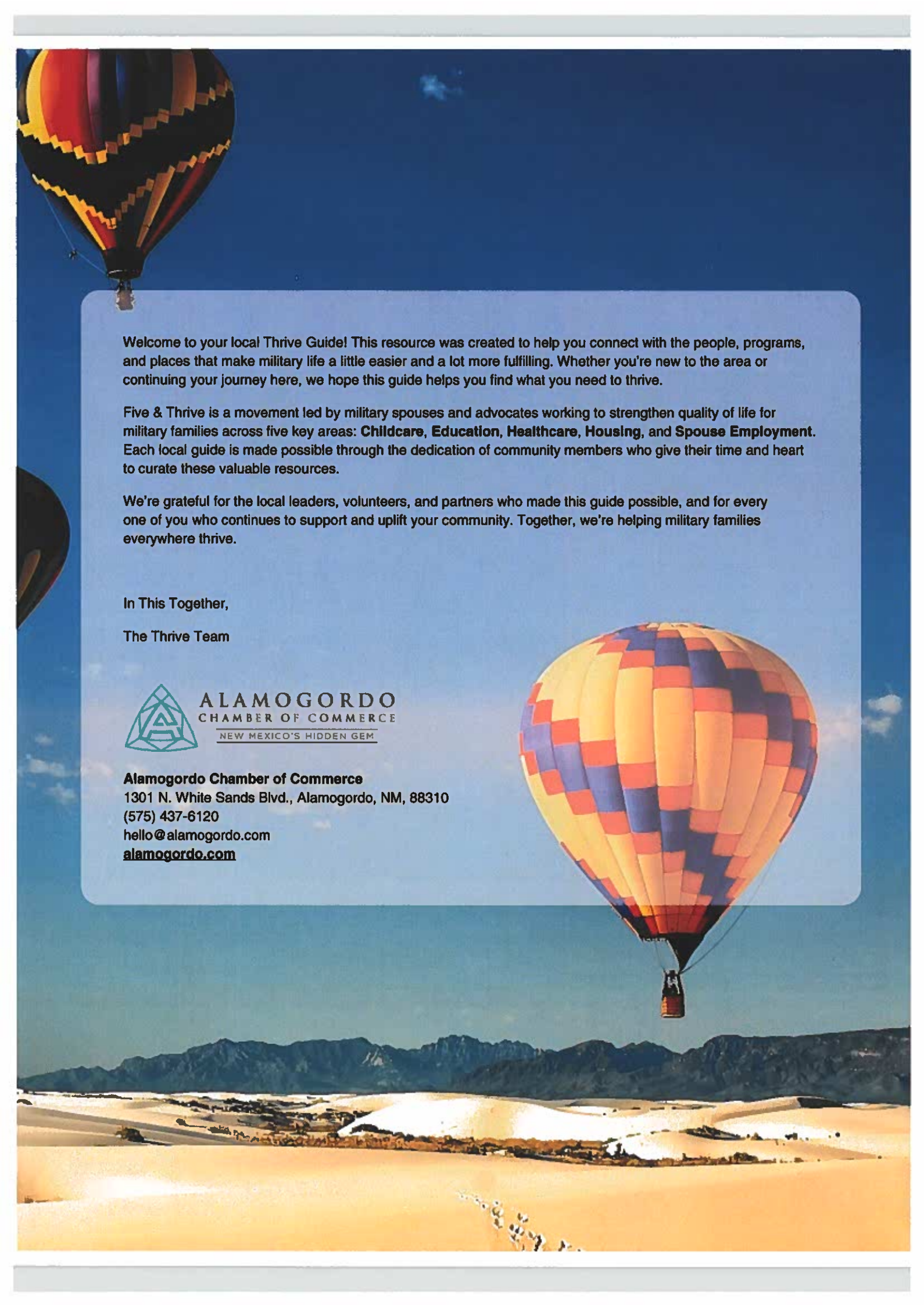

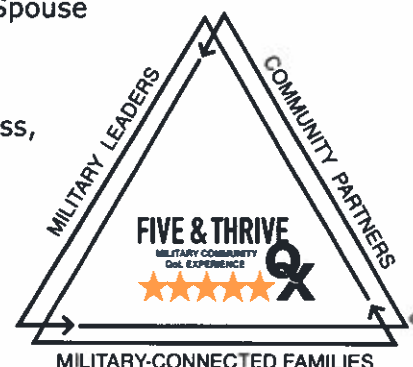

ALL MILITARY FAMILIES SHOULD HAVE ACCESS TO:

- ★ Safe and affordable **childcare**.
- ★ Quality **education**, seamless educational transitions during relocations, and equitable resources for special education and other essential services.
- ★ Quality **healthcare**, including mental health services for the whole family.
- ★ Safe and affordable **housing**.
- ★ Equitable and meaningful **employment** for every military-connected spouse.



THE STATISTICS

Over **80%** of active duty families have difficulty finding **childcare**.¹Most military children will attend **6 to 9** different schools during their K through 12 **education**.²More than **60%** of military families are burdened with paying more than they can comfortably afford for **housing**.³Out of the 60%, **80%** reported monthly housing expenses not covered by their BAH were in excess of \$200 out-of-pocket/month.³Almost **30%** of military families reported lack of **spouse employment** as a contributing factor to their financial stress.**21%**Military spouse unemployment rates are nearly **5x** the national rate.**4.3%**Military spouses reported **childcare** being too expensive as the top reason they are not working.Nearly **1 out of 4** active duty military families report they do not receive mental **healthcare**, but would like to.**44%** indicated that finding an available provider was a reason they do not receive care.³

Although the order and degree of these five issues vary from installation to installation, they consistently rise to the top according to feedback from military families and surveys from multiple organizations. Note: Members of Exceptional Family Member Program (EFMP) are impacted in unique ways by each of the "Five & Thrive" QoL issues.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN A CHILD CARE PROGRAM

✓ Licensed & Accredited

Make sure the program is licensed by the state. This means it meets health, safety, and quality standards. Many providers also earn national accreditation – a sign of even higher commitment to excellence.

✓ Safe, Nurturing Environment

Look for a clean, secure space where children are happy, engaged, and cared for. Ask about safety protocols, check-in procedures, and emergency plans.

✓ Trained, Caring Staff

Ask if educators are background-checked and trained in early childhood development, CPR, and first aid. Great programs have low child-to-teacher ratios and staff who truly connect with kids.

✓ Curriculum That Fits Your Family

Every child is unique. So is every program. Look for approaches that match your values – such as play-based learning, Montessori, dual-language immersion, Indigenous-led teaching, or nature-based care.

✓ Nutrition & Wellness

Healthy meals matter! Ask what's served, how meals are prepared, and whether the food reflects your culture and family preferences.



QUESTIONS TO ASK WHEN TOURING A PROGRAM

- What is your child-to-teacher ratio?
- What is your approach to learning and play?
- How do you handle discipline and redirection?
- How do you communicate with families?
- What are your hours, fees, and schedule options?
- Are meals and snacks provided?
- How do you celebrate culture and diversity?

SCHOOL LIAISON PROGRAM MANAGER

The School Liaison Program Manager helps parents ease the transition of the mobile military lifestyle and can assist before your PCS, upon arrival, while at your installation, and when you prepare to depart for your next duty station. The school liaison is a military-connected dependent education professional serving as the link between military families and all surrounding school districts, ensuring maximum educational opportunities for academic success.

CITY MANAGER'S REPORT

Acting City Manager Hernandez made the following comments:

REMARKS AND INQUIRIES BY THE CITY COMMISSION

Mayor Payne said the ribbon-cutting for Alamogordo MainStreet was on Saturday night. It is exciting to see it open. The business owners are very enthusiastic. I also attended a memorial on Saturday morning for one of our employees, Sam Petrie, who passed away. Also, to address rumors, I have no desire, intention, or plan to be the City Manager of Alamogordo.

Commissioner Burnett said there was a hole on Florida Avenue in front of the school. What is the timeline on that? Acting City Manager Hernandez said she would check on it. Commissioner Rardin said to add another hole; there is one on South Florida Avenue between Mimosa Avenue and the next street.

2. Consider, and act upon, the award of RFP 2025-015 On-Call Drainage Maintenance Services to K E & G Construction and White Mountain Brush Control. (Jimmy Vargas, Public Works Director)

Commissioner Rardin asked what the fiscal impact of this would be. It does not give us a number. It just gave us the scoring sheet. Public Works Director Vargas said the actual bid amount was around \$400,000. Commissioner Rardin asked if that was for everything in town. Public Works Director Vargas said yes, that it is just going to be for the maintenance of all the ditches. Commissioner Rardin asked if this was for one year or one go around. Public Works Director Vargas said one year. Commissioner Rardin asked if there were any other responsive bidders. Public Works Director Vargas said there were two. Commissioner Rardin asked what the other came in at. Public Works Director Vargas said he was not sure, but that would be more for weed abatement in the Spring. It wouldn't really be for maintenance. Finance Director Huff said she could clarify how this was procured. This was on an on-call contract and will be on a task order basis. The money he has for these two contractors to do task orders is \$400,000. Commissioner Rardin asked if that was up to \$400,000. Finance Director Huff said correct. They submitted their cost sheets and for how much for what they are doing. Once we know the areas, we will provide the scope of work and the cost of the scope of work, based on the pricing provided in the RFP. They did not actually provide prices for every competitive bid. There were only two that responded. They are both qualified and can do this work.

Commissioner Burnett moved to approve.

Commissioner Tapley seconded the motion.

7. Consider, and act upon, the award of Public Works Bid No. 2025-007, Alameda Park Zoo Duck Pond Improvements Project No.ZO2401, to Lancon, Inc., related to the Alameda Park Zoo Duck Pond Improvements Project for an amount not to exceed \$134,800.54, including NMGR. (Justen Boyle, Project Manager)

Commissioner Burnett asked if this was Capital Outlay money or money we had moved. Senior Project Manager Boyle said it was a grant. Commissioner Burnett asked what was left for the Zoo besides the Duck Pond. Senior Project Manager Boyle said there is a sewer and storm drain project outside the Zoo on the south side. That would

cover the storm drain from White Sands Boulevard to the tracks, and then the sewer from the Zoo to 10th Street. Another project is a design for a bear enclosure. We will have a contractor go out to the Zoo this week to determine where we are with the bathroom situation and see if it is possible to tie in or if the sewer must be replaced. I have 100% design on irrigation. Commissioner Burnett asked about the netting. Senior Project Manager Boyle said that was this item. Commissioner Burnett asked if the netting was for the whole pond. Senior Project Manager Boyle said no, the north end of the pond.

Commissioner Burnett moved to approve.

Mayor Pro-Tem McDonald seconded the motion.

Commissioner Burnett asked if they were just adding a liquor license. City Clerk Hughs said this hearing was for an alcohol license that Mr. Norwell already has at Pizza Patio. He just wanted to add LLC, but the Alcohol Beverage Control Division required him to begin from scratch. That is all this is, and he has changed nothing. He is present if you want to ask questions.

Commissioner Rardin moved to approve.

Consider, and act upon, the question of whether the Alcoholic Beverage Control Division of the State of New Mexico should approve or disapprove the issuance of a Restaurant B - Beer, Wine, and Spirits Liquor License with On-Premises consumption only with No Patio Service located 902 New York Avenue to OMG Alamo, LLC, dba Oppenheimer Gasthaus, App. No. BLA-0000011622. (Dylan Aleshire, Deputy City Clerk)

Clerk Hughs said to clarify, this is a new Restaurant B-type alcohol license.

Mayor Pro-Tem McDonald moved to Approve.

Commissioner Guthrie seconded the motion.

Motion Passed with a vote of 7 - 0 - 0.

NEW BUSINESS

10. Consider, and act upon, the naming of the Natatorium. (Belinda Bass, Parks & Recreation Director)

Parks & Recreation Director Bass said we did the polls and put them out to the public to vote on. These are the top ten name choices, as chosen by the public. The public's top choice at 44% was Cactus Cove. The second choice at 13% was Alamogordo Aquatic Center.

Commissioner Tapley moved to name the Natatorium the Alamogordo Aquatic Center.

Commissioner Robinson seconded the motion.

Motion Passed with a vote of 7 - 0 - 0.

11. Consider, and act upon, the approval of bowling lane upgrades at the Fun Center and direct staff to identify or pursue funding options. (Johnny Adams, General Manager, Frizzell Frizzell Jr, Chief Operating Officer, Stephanie Hernandez, Acting City Manager).

Mr. Frizzel Jr. said he was managing the contract for Rocket City. It has been four months since we reopened the Fun Center. We have handed a few revenue-sharing checks to Acting City Manager Hernandez. There have been staffing challenges, and we are overstaffed a bit as we want to see people come up to hospitality standards. Overstaffing is typical when you first open a business. Our biggest challenges have been the old pinsetter machines. We have been able to purchase a new laser tag system out of our own budget, and we are installing it to get it running in a few days. We will roll out a new menu before Christmas. We have been experimenting with karaoke nights and doing some DJs in the backrooms. We also added pool tables and are getting arcade games switched out. I hope to get your approval to get changes done, because it will be a big difference in getting new business in.

Commissioner Robison asked if the new marketing plan could be shared within the month or so. Mr. Frizzel Jr. said yes, we will need to get more regional people in there, like those passing through from out of town. We have a good marketing push we can share. We can email that to Acting City Manager Hernandez, who can share it with you.

Mayor Payne said that Mayor Pro-Tem McDonald said earlier that this says the existing lanes are thirty years old. I want to clarify that when the facility was built, it was built with used lanes. They did not put new lanes in there. They really are about thirty years old because they are used. The facility itself is almost nine years old. Mr. Adams said our biggest obstacles right now are that the lanes are old, and finding parts for them seems to be the hardest portion of it. The downtime with that hurts us a bit more. Mayor Pro-Tem McDonald asked how many lanes were in operation. Mr. Adams said I have twenty lanes operational right now, that is on a day-to-day basis, to make sure they stay operational. That also focuses on me holding up three to four technicians in there as well. Sometimes we run down to seven lanes knocked out for the night. Right now, we have 14 teams constantly showing up for leagues. We are moving in the right direction, but we are asking for help to get the proper equipment, which would let us hold more league nights and community events. Commissioner Rardin asked if they were looking to replace the lanes or just the pinsetters? Mr. Adams said the pinsetters. The lanes themselves are actually in very good shape. Some modifications may need to be done to the lanes, though. We received an 82% rating on the lanes, which is a silver rating. We would like to eventually get to a gold rating. However, the biggest issue right now is the pinsetters themselves. Commissioner Rardin said going back to the Mayor's comment, I believe the pinsetters were the refurbished equipment. The lanes themselves were new. Mayor Payne said yes, the lanes themselves are fine, it is just the equipment. City Attorney Mori said to clarify, it is not just the pinsetters, but also the scoring system as well, correct? Mr. Adams said the scoring system comes with the exact vendor. The vendors use the scoring system they built, and it is not compatible with anything else. As of now, we are compatible with the scoring systems if we keep these pinsetters. However, the pinsetters are thirty years old, and finding parts is a big challenge. Mayor Payne asked what the estimate for the scoring system would be. Mr. Adams said one vendor's total is \$585,273.44 with everything included. That is a complete remodel, takeout, and removal of the pinsetters, along with putting a new scoring system in. Commissioner Burnett asked how much downtime that would create. Mr. Adams said the vendor estimated a downtime of three weeks, but they will not start work until mid-January. It starts when they get the first deposit. If we were to go with that vendor, they assured me of a February 1st start. Mayor Payne asked if that was the vendor they wished to go with. Mr. Adams said that is the one he recommends. Mr. Frizzel Jr. said that it is the one that will last the longest, and it is top of the line. Mayor Payne said so, if we figure this out and it goes, will you give people plenty of warning that the lanes will be down for three weeks? Mr. Adams said absolutely. After that, we will be able to have 24 lanes open, which will allow us to bring in large tournaments. I have put in bids to host three State tournaments in 2027, but the catch there is that the 24 lanes need to be operational. With the new equipment, it will be 100% ready to go. We are talking around 150 participants at two different times, and revenue for hotels and restaurants in the area for the whole weekend.

Commissioner Robinson asked if modifications needed to be made for a lot of people to sit there. There isn't a lot of space for spectators. Mr. Adams said we are moving forward with that. We plan to put more seating so more people can watch. We have put more tables in there to see if that works, and there are more upgrades we could do for better seating. Fire Code won't allow me to put stadium seating in there. Mr. Frizzel Jr. said we have added one table per lane. Mr. Adams said we ended up with an extra four seats per lane minimum.

Commissioner Tapley said a place in Ruidoso recently changed the lanes to string setters. Have you rolled on those lanes? Mr. Frizzel Jr. said he had. He was in the league there during the summer when they first switched. They went with the vendor we discussed, and it is an amazing system. It rolls just like regular pins. Many of the league

bowlers were skeptical about going onto string pins, but once they started using them, they were fine with it. Nobody had any complaints, and some were happier because they felt they played a bit better. It is a slick, low-maintenance system that is best for the operators, the people who own the bowling alley. Their manager said their maintenance costs went down to nothing, and the service from the vendor was amazing. Commissioner Tapley asked if the breakdowns during bowling were minimal. Mr. Frizzel Jr. said there were practically none. In bowling three games for a league night, there were maybe two tangle-ups that night. It took the guy maybe ten seconds after going back there to untangle them. Whereas right now, on our 24 lanes, you have 10 people back there. It is rather dangerous too. Mr. Adams said that with the safety measures on the new pinsetters, we do not worry as much. They have a very low voltage. Commissioner Rardin asked if these new ones used a conventional pin or not. Mr. Adams said it is a specific pin because of the drilling we have to do into it to ensure it stays within the string. Commissioner Rardin said so there is still an actual pin. Mr. Adams said yes. Commissioner Rardin said you said these were top of the line. Are they comparable to others? Mr. Adams said they are fairly comparable. We use the scoring system for US Bowling now, but they will never allow us to own the software. We will always be leasing it, and it is a decent amount per month. Brunswick has reached out a few times, and they would probably be my second choice. Commissioner Rardin said it looks like they are all comparable in price and within \$50,000 of each other.

Commissioner Burnett asked what our options were here. Acting City Manager Hernandez said this is a City-owned facility, and it is a quality-of-life. My go-to would be Fund 105, and we have money in that fund. Commissioner Rardin asked if that was the only place we could pull it from. Acting City Manager Hernandez said it would probably have to be the General Fund. Mayor Payne said she liked the Fund 105 idea. How long will these last? Mr. Adams said these will last 30 years, almost a lifetime. There will be 24/7 tech support with Qubica, which is top-of-the-line right now. Their equipment is in 15,000 facilities. We would have full ownership and a two-year warranty on parts and any maintenance. They are also fairly close, being in Arizona. It would be a day trip for them.

Mr. Frizzel Jr. said our biggest complaints right now are the customer experience part of it. They get on a lane, something breaks, and they have to move onto another lane. They get frustrated, do not want to play anymore, and they do not come back. If we have something brand new and they have a good experience, they will tell someone else. League bowlers especially hate it when something breaks.

Mayor Payne said to clarify for everyone, Fund 105 is the LEDA fund. I think using that is a great idea. The money is there, and we can use it for that. We should be investing in our assets. Why find the money somewhere else when we have it in that fund? This is something the entire community can benefit from.

Commissioner Guthrie moved to use Fund 105 to fund the upgrades necessary for the Rocket City Family Fun Center.

Commissioner Burnett asked if that motion was for Qubica. Mayor Payne asked if we were going with the recommendation from Mr. Adams and Mr. Frizzel Junior. Commissioner Guthrie said yes, I can modify the motion. Commissioner Guthrie said she moved to modify her motion for Qubica to be used, and to use and approve Fund 105. So what would the dollar amount be? Commissioner Rardin said do not put a dollar amount. Leave it open. Commissioner Guthrie said we could leave it open for whatever repairs are required.

Commissioner Guthrie moved to approve using IMG's recommendation of Qubica and take the funding from Fund 105.

Commissioner Rardin asked if a cap should be put on this. Are we pretty certain that \$586,000 is it? Mr. Adams said they were pretty certain. We have done extensive research on all of it. Commissioner Guthrie asked if there should be a specific amount. Commissioner Rardin said maybe \$600,000 or \$625,000. Commissioner Guthrie said so not to exceed a certain amount, \$650,000.

Commissioner Guthrie moved to approve using IMG's recommendation of Qubica and to take the funding from Fund 105 in an amount not to exceed \$650,000.

Commissioner Robinson seconded the motion.

Motion Passed with a vote of 7 - 0 - 0.

12. Appointments to Boards and Committees. (Susan L. Payne, Mayor)

Mayor Payne appointed Lee Scholes to his 4th term on the Airport Zoning Board. No one was opposed.

Background:

The Open Meetings Act requires each public body to establish its notice provisions annually. This Resolution accomplishes that requirement. The final agenda for each regular meeting of the City Commission is to be posted seventy-two (72) hours prior to the meeting.

Since the city does not have a daily newspaper, and the newspaper requires several days' advance notice to publish, it is challenging to hold Special and Emergency Meetings in a timely manner. Therefore, additional language to the Resolution for the posting of notices in six locations within the Municipality will meet the notice requirements for these types of meetings.

3-1-1. Municipalities; 3-1-2. Definitions

J. "publish" or "publication" means printing in a newspaper that maintains an office in the municipality and is of general circulation within the municipality or, **if such newspaper is a nondaily paper that will not be circulated to the public in time to meet publication requirements** or if there is no newspaper that maintains an office in the municipality and is of general circulation within the municipality, **then "publish" or "publication" means posting in six public places within the municipality on the first day that publication is required in a newspaper that maintains an office in the municipality and is of general circulation within the municipality. One of the public places where posting shall be made is the office of the municipal clerk, who shall maintain the posting during the length of time necessary to comply with the provisions relating to the number of times publication is required in a newspaper of general circulation within the municipality. The municipal clerk may, in addition to posting, publish one or more times in a newspaper of general circulation in the municipality.**

RESOLUTION NO. 2026-01

RESOLUTION DETERMINING REASONABLE NOTICE OF MEETINGS OF THE GOVERNING BODY OF ALAMOGORDO, NEW MEXICO (ALAMOGORDO CITY COMMISSION)

WHEREAS, the State of New Mexico has determined that the formation of public policy and the conduct of business by vote shall be conducted in meetings which are open to the public, as set forth in Section 10-15-1 NMSA 1978 (As Amended); and,

WHEREAS, reasonable notice of the time and place of any meeting of a public body is necessary to carry out the policy set forth above; and,

WHEREAS, in those limited instances in which meetings of this Alamogordo City Commission may be closed to the public, the law and the public business also require reasonable notice to the public of the time and place of such meeting; and,

WHEREAS, Section 10-15-1 NMSA 1978 (As Amended) requires each public body to determine at least annually what notice shall be reasonable when applied to the public body.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Alamogordo City Commission of the City of Alamogordo, New Mexico, that reasonable time for giving notice of meetings is:

REGULAR MEETINGS: Notice shall be given at least ten (10) days in advance of any regular meeting.

SPECIAL MEETINGS: Notice shall be given at least three (3) days in advance of any special meeting.

EMERGENCY MEETINGS: Notice shall be given at least twenty-four (24) hours in advance of any meeting considering emergency matters involving a clear and present danger to the health, welfare, or safety of the citizens of the City of Alamogordo.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that reasonable manner for giving notice of meetings shall be:

REGULAR MEETINGS: Notices of the date, time, and place of such meeting shall be posted in at least two conspicuous places in or about the City Hall Building, Alamogordo, New Mexico, at least ten (10) days prior to the meeting, or by publication [as that term is defined in Section 3-1- 2(J) NMSA 1978 (As Amended)], as well as on the city web site of notice of date, time, and place of meeting at least ten (10) days prior to the meeting. An agenda containing a list of specific items of business to be discussed or transacted at the meeting, or information about how an agenda may be obtained, shall be posted in at least two conspicuous places in or about the City Hall Building, Alamogordo, New Mexico, at least seventy-two (72) hours prior to the meeting. Proof of notice shall be accomplished by executing and filing in the official minutes of the Commission, a certificate by the Municipal Clerk attesting to posting in compliance herewith or by the publisher of the publishing newspaper attesting to publication in compliance herewith. Notice shall be provided to broadcast stations licensed by the Federal Communications Commission and newspapers of general circulation that submit a written request for such notice.

SPECIAL AND EMERGENCY MEETINGS: Notices of the date, time, and place of the meeting shall be posted in six public places within the municipality; in the office of the City Clerk, the Alamogordo Public Library, the Civic Center, the Recreation Center, the Senior Center, and the Zoo, and in at least two conspicuous places in or about the City Hall Building, Alamogordo, New Mexico, at least three (3) days prior to the meeting for a Special Meeting, and at least twenty-four (24) hours prior to the meeting for an Emergency Meeting. Proof of notice shall be accomplished by executing and filing in the official minutes of the Commission, a certificate by the Municipal Clerk attesting to posting in compliance herewith. Notice shall be provided to broadcast stations licensed by the Federal Communications Commission and

newspapers of general circulation that submit a written request for such notice.

It is expressly allowed by rule of the Alamogordo City Commission that a member or members may participate in a meeting of the Commission by means of a conference telephone or other similar communications equipment when it is otherwise difficult or impossible for the member to attend in person. Each member participating by conference telephone must be identifiable when speaking, all Commission members must be able to hear each other, and members of the public attending the meeting must be able to hear any Commissioner who speaks.

ORDINANCE NO.1720

DECLARING THE NEED FOR DESIGNATION BY OTERO COUNTY, NEW MEXICO BY AND THROUGH THE COUNTY'S BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OF CERTAIN REAL PROPERTY WITHIN THE COUNTY'S AREA OF OPERATION OVERLAPPING THE MUNICIPAL BOUNDARIES OF THE CITY OF ALAMOGORDO AS A METROPOLITAN REDEVELOPMENT AREA.

WHEREAS, the City of Alamogordo, New Mexico (the "City") is a legally and regularly created, established, organized and existing municipality under the general laws of the State of New Mexico; and

WHEREAS, the New Mexico legislature has passed the "Metropolitan Redevelopment Code" (the "Code"), Sections 3-60A-1 to 3-60A-49 inclusive, NMSA 1978, as amended, which authorizes local governments, including Otero County, New Mexico (the "County"), to designate blighted areas that constitute a serious and growing concern, injurious to the public health, safety, morals and welfare of the residents of the state, as Metropolitan Redevelopment Areas (as defined in the Code) and prepare a Metropolitan Redevelopment Plan (as defined in the Code) for the rehabilitation or redevelopment of such areas; and

WHEREAS, the Code authorizes the local government forming the district to afford maximum opportunity for the rehabilitation or redevelopment of Metropolitan Redevelopment Areas to private enterprise; and

WHEREAS, the City is in need of additional housing opportunities for its residents and the County has received from a private enterprise (the "Developer") a proposal for the construction of housing in an area of the County, within the City, that the County believes is blighted (the "Proposed Redevelopment Area"); and

WHEREAS, the Proposed Redevelopment Area is all or a portion, as determined by the County, of the property described below:

Starting at the intersection of South White Sands Boulevard and Panorama Boulevard, and continuing east on Panorama Boulevard to the alley way west of Uranus Drive; then south along that alley way to the north section line of Section 30, Township 16 South, Range 10 East; thence continuing east along said section line which becomes the north section line of Section 32 and 33 of Township 16 South, Range 10 East to South Scenic Drive; thence north on South Scenic Drive to the alley way south of Abbott Drive; thence west, along the alignment of that alley way, which aligns with Fourth Street, to White Sands Boulevard. Thence south on White Sands Boulevard to the point of beginning of the tract herein described.

WHEREAS, a local government may undertake the powers granted by the Code within the local government's area of operation (as defined in the Code) which shall not include an area that lies within the jurisdiction of another local government unless an ordinance has been adopted by the other local government declaring a need therefor (a "Necessity Ordinance"); and

WHEREAS, the County's Proposed Redevelopment Area overlaps the City's jurisdiction, so the County may not designate the Proposed Redevelopment Area unless the City adopts a Necessity Ordinance for the Proposed Redevelopment Area; and

WHEREAS, the City desires to cooperate with the County in order to pursue the designation of the Proposed Redevelopment Area as a Metropolitan Redevelopment Area in order to afford the maximum opportunity for the rehabilitation or redevelopment of Metropolitan Redevelopment Areas to private enterprise; and

WHEREAS, the City is a necessary party related to the Metropolitan Redevelopment Plan and oversight of the Proposed Metropolitan Redevelopment Area and shall be involved in preparation of the Metropolitan Redevelopment Plan and any proposed amendments; and

WHEREAS, the County has indicated its intent, upon adoption by the City of this Necessity Ordinance, to hold a public hearing on December 9, 2025, beginning at 9:00 am at the County Commission Chambers, 1101 New York Ave, Alamogordo, New Mexico 88310, with respect to the consideration of a resolution designating of the Proposed Redevelopment Area as a Metropolitan Redevelopment Area, as contemplated in the Code, and the City intends to cooperate with the County to accomplish the same.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF ALAMOGORDO THAT:

Section 1. Necessity of Designation by County of Proposed Redevelopment Area. The City Commission hereby declares the need for the County's proposed designation of the Proposed Redevelopment Area as a Metropolitan Redevelopment Area in order to afford the maximum opportunity for the rehabilitation or redevelopment of Metropolitan Redevelopment Areas to private enterprise. This declaration is intended to meet the requirements of Section 3-60A-4(P) of the Code.

Section 2. City Involvement with Metropolitan Redevelopment Area and Plan. The City is a necessary party related to the development of the Metropolitan Redevelopment Plan and oversight of the Metropolitan Redevelopment Area and shall work with the County, and be consulted, in regards to both.

Section 3. Ordinance Irrepealable. After the designation of the Proposed Metropolitan Redevelopment Area as a Metropolitan Redevelopment Area, this Necessity Ordinance shall be and remain irrepealable until such Metropolitan Redevelopment Area is no longer treated as such under the Code.

Section 4. Severability Clause. If any section, paragraph, clause or provision of this Ordinance shall for any reason be held to be invalid or unenforceable, the invalidity or

unenforceability of such section, paragraph, clause or provision shall not affect any of the remaining provisions of this Ordinance.

Section 5. Repealer Clause. All bylaws, orders, resolutions and ordinances, or parts thereof, inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed to the extent only of such inconsistency. This repealer shall not be construed to revive any bylaw, order, resolution or ordinance, or part thereof, heretofore repealed.

Section 6. Effective Date. Upon due adoption of this Ordinance, it shall be recorded in the book of the Governmental Unit kept for that purpose, authenticated by the signatures of the Mayor and the City Clerk of the Governmental Unit, and the title and general summary of the subject matter contained in this Ordinance (set out in Section 17 below) shall be published in a newspaper which is of general circulation in the Governmental Unit, or posted in accordance with law, and such Ordinance shall be in full force and effect thereafter, in accordance with law.

Section 7. General Summary for Publication. Pursuant to the general laws of the State, the title and a general summary of the subject matter contained in this Ordinance shall be published in substantially the following form:

Background: Notification of a rate adjustment from Southwest Disposal is required under Section 7.5 Adjustments to Service Fee Municipal Solid Waste Agreement with Waste Connections of New Mexico, Inc. d/b/a SOUTHWEST DISPOSAL dated February 1, 2020.

As stated in the notice from Southwest Disposal dated October 28, 2025 the rate adjustment is an increase in the monthly residential charge of 3.01% as well as increases for overload services and city facilities.

Residential Service	\$0.36 per month
Overload Service	\$1.79 per unit
City facilities	\$409.69 per month

NOTE: These are the rates Southwest Disposal charges the city for solid waste pick-up. Residential customers are charged, in addition to the SW Disposal rates, \$3.20 per month convenience center fee and \$2.71 per month tipping/admin fee. The current monthly charge to residential customers is \$17.99. If the increase is approved the monthly charge will increase to \$18.35 per month.

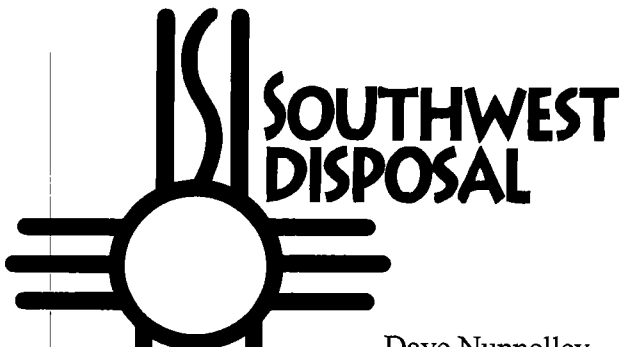
